January 1st Hike in Ridley Creek State Park

What will you be doing on New Years Day 2025? Come celebrate it with us at Ridley Creek State Park. The Friends of Ridley are again hosting a First Day Hike along the Equestrian Trail, beginning promptly at 10 am, Wednesday, January 1, behind Pavilion #8.

Gary Sawyer will lead a 3.5-mile lollipop loop with views of the creek and a stop at the historic hilltop Russell Cemetery. It is expected to last 2 to 2 ½ hours.

The hike starts at the parking lot behind Pavilion 8, descends to the creek at Gradyville Road, passes by an area recovering from a tornado in 2019, and winds

around a lovely wooded section up and over Hunting Hill and the Russell Cemetery. The trail is wide, mostly gravel, with good footing. Be prepared for early January weather conditions, and for elevation gains of about 350 ft.

We will have hot chocolate, coffee, and light refreshments at the trailhead after the hike. We have a limit of 25 participants for the hike. Dogs are allowed on leash at all times. Please register by email to Gary at muddyboots@comcast.net to secure a spot.

Appreciations for Volunteer Aidan Sudall

At an early age, Aidan Sudall had an interest in the outdoors and the environment. He was about 10 years old when he first started volunteering at Ridley Creek State Park in the Adopt-a-Trail program. He began working on the Yellow Trail from Area 16 to Area 17. His parents would drive Aidan to and from the park and helped initially, before he could drive.

When Aidan was asked if he would backfill for a vacancy on the White Trail, he gladly accepted and added a section of the White Trail (to the "cow bridge") to his original assignment. Aidan continued doing his trail work even after he started school at Penn State University's main campus. He was also employed at Valley Forge National Historical Park, in the Youth Conservation Corps program, during his high school summers.

But now he is leaving us because he is working at the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) as an intern in the Pathways program. He hopes for a permanent job with the EPA after he graduates from Penn State with a degree in Environmental Resource Management. Good luck to you, Aidan!

On behalf of the Friends of Ridley, I wrote a thank you note to Aidan, saying "you have shown real dedication to improving the park environment and I believe you'll be a tremendous asset to the EPA and to the environmental health of the country. Ridley Creek State Park and I will certainly miss you, but we wish you all the best in all your future endeavors."





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Ceremony for New Children's Playground Held in April

The Friends of Ridley Creek State Park held our official ribbon cutting ceremony for the new "sensory playground" at Area 8 (near the stables) on April 20. It features a dozen interactive panes and activities for smaller children to enjoy while at the park. There are imaginative panels that invite children to hunt for treasure, listen for natural sounds, and solve some motion puzzles.

Park Manager Lexi Rose cut the ribbon at the ceremony and said, "This new playground adds a fun dimension to our wonderful park, and I am thankful to the Ridley Creek State Park Friends group for making this playground possible." The project was made possible in part by support from the Friends of \$25,000 of funds that come from members and donors.

Sensory playgrounds provide nurturing and inclusive environments that are designed to stimulate the senses such as sight, sound, smell, touch, balance, and proprioception. They support brain development, enhanced memory, development of ability to do complex tasks, and problem solving.

The monthly first Saturday volunteer trail work team spent several workdays helping to prepare the site, including installing a 12-inch high retaining barrier to hold in the wood chip floor of the playground. 
Since then, two new park benches supplied by the Friends and a picnic table supplied by the park have been installed, giving parents a place to sit and keep an eye on their children.

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
2024 Photo Contest Results



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Exploring Pennsylvania's Parks: Neshaminy State Park

This article is the fifteenth in a series about other state parks in Pennsylvania, contributed by Friends Board member, the much-traveled Paul Mickle.

In this edition of our state parks tour series, we will be returning to Bucks County to visit a place called Neshaminy State Park. The park is located along the Delaware River in southern Bucks County on the north side of Philadelphia.

The park is around 330 acres and includes walking trails, open lawns, picnic areas, a swimming pool, and a marina for docking boats sailing up and down the Delaware River. Even though the park is over 100 miles from the Atlantic Ocean, the riverbanks react to the tidal changes and the waterfront areas have a nautical feel. In addition to being on the Delaware River, the park also surrounds the confluence of Neshaminy Creek, giving it lots of waterfront views.

The land for Neshaminy State Park originated as part of the Logan Family Estate, which holds significance because James Logan was the secretary to William Penn. The park was officially founded in 1956 and continues to offer outdoor activities in many forms. There are over 4 miles of hiking trails, both paved and dirt, as well as expansive views of the riverway and waterfront. Swimming is permitted in the pool and fishing is permitted in the river,

however the fishing regulations are set by the Fish and

Game Commission.
